day. This latest hurdle is iust another example of how we come together and focus on the positive."


Daniella DaSilva, a sophomore, said she was happy to see her teachers again.

Free meals given daily at Mizner Park

Free meals are being served up at Boca Raton's Mizner Park, southern Palm Beach County's first distribution site set up by Hospitality Helping Hands (H3), a nonprofit organization created to retain jobs and help feed those who have been financially affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The meals are being distributed every day from 1 to 6 p.m. in front of Kapow Noodle Bar and the Dubliner. Both restaurants are part of the Subculture restaurant group owned Rodney Mayo, founder of Hospitality Helping Hands.

Boca Raton City Councilman Andy Thomson has donated \$25,000, a surplus from his recent reelection campaign, to the cause. He plans to volunteer at the site throughout the effort.

He's asking others to give their time as well.

"Our hospitality industry is one of the hardest-hit sectors of our economy. Both restaurants and their employees are suffering," Thomson said. "That's why Hospitality Helping Hands is serving such a crucial mission: keeping restaurants open, keeping people working and giving away meals to those who need them. Once I heard their vision, I had to get involved, not only with funding but with lending a hand. I hope folks will join me."

Over 27,000 meals have been given to displaced hospitality workers since H3 began late last month in the parking lot of Howley's

Restaurant on South Dixie Highway in West Palm Beach.

The distribution process is contactless with volunteers staying at a safe distance. The driver can roll down their window or indicate how many meals they want by holding up their fingers. When the volunteer returns with the food, they signal for the driver to open the trunk and place the bags of food in it.

"Instead of closing our doors, we chose to answer this call to action to help all of our fellow industry peers," said Vaughan Dugan, owner/partner of Kapow Noodle Bar. "We served 1,000 meals in Boca on our first day. With the support of the community and our staff, we have risen to the occasion and are serving the greater good of our fellow hospitality family and community."

Mizner Park is at 327 Plaza Real in Boca Raton. West Palm Beach distri-

bution sites include Howley's, 4700 S. Dixie Highway, and Hullabaloo, 17 Clematis St.

Free meals are available from 1 to 6 p.m. seven days a week at all three locations.

From 1 to 6 p.m Tuesdays through Fridays, pick up free meals at Ezell Hester Center, 1907 N. Seacrest Blvd., in Boynton Beach, and Troy's BBQ, 1198 N. Dixie Highway in Boca

Weekly groceries are being given out from 3 to 7 p.m. Wednesdays at 3950 Georgia Ave. in West Palm Beach. Call 561-833-5691 to apply for the program.
